Dr. Beth-Sarah Wright is the creator of the **DIGNITY Lens**®, a practical framework that helps leaders and organizations live more authentically into their mission and values by centering human dignity. Through her writing, speaking, leadership formation, consulting, and strategic advising, she partners with organizations seeking to strengthen integrity, increase capacity, navigate adaptive challenges, and build authentic communities where people and mission flourish together.

Dr. Wright is the Founder of **Thrive With Dignity, LLC** and currently serves as Acting Executive Director of the Absalom Jones Episcopal Center for Racial Healing in the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta. Through her writing, speaking, leadership formation, consulting, and strategic advising, she serves schools and universities, corporations, nonprofits, dioceses, and faith communities across the United States and internationally, equipping leaders to cultivate communities rooted in dignity, justice, healing, and authentic human connection.

Her clients and audiences have included Veolia Group, the National Association of Episcopal Schools, the Independent Schools Association of the Southwest, Anglican schools throughout Australia, dioceses across The Episcopal Church, universities, nonprofit organizations, and corporate leaders.

Dr. Wright is the author of seven books exploring dignity, leadership, mental health, healing, and spiritual formation. Her book *DIGNITY: Seven Strategies for Creating Authentic Community* was selected as the 2023 Featured Book of the Year by the National Association of Episcopal Schools. Together with *The DIGNITY Lens Workbook*, it provides practical strategies that help organizations examine the alignment between their mission, values, and everyday practices.

Prior to founding Thrive With Dignity, Dr. Wright served for ten years as Director of Enrollment Management at Holy Innocents' Episcopal School in Atlanta. She previously taught at New York University and Spelman College and currently serves as an Adjunct Assistant Professor in Psychiatry at Emory University School of Medicine, where her work explores the intersection of dignity, identity, mental health, and human flourishing.

Dr. Wright holds a Ph.D. in Performance Studies from New York University, an MPhil in Anthropology from University of Cambridge, and a B.A. in Sociology and Afro-American Studies from Princeton University. Originally from Jamaica, she has lived, studied, and worked internationally, bringing a global perspective to leadership, organizational transformation, and authentic community building.
